- Revolutionary War: British seized meetinghouse for storage and salt 1780 beef; Oliver Hart forced to flee Charleston
- 1787 Richard Furman called as pastor; Sunday School established
- Property of 63 Church was awarded 1787
- Church accepted Constitution; amended 1824; still in use 1791
- Petition to incorporate the General Committee for the Charleston Baptist 1792 Association; By-product: Mercer College, Furman University and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary

- Mission group started new church Easter Cooper Baptist
- Hurricane Hugo: Extensive renovations to the sanctuary
- Period of division in the Church
- Property on James Island purchased (30 acres for school use)

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- Named by the International Mission Board "Global Priority Church" for missions partnerships
- Purchased George Griffith 62 acre tract, James Island for future development
- Sold property at Market Street

- 2015: Athletic complex opened on James Island
- 2018: Grand opening of new high school campus on James Island
- 2018: Recognition to honor the memory of enslaved members of First Baptist Church and dedication of plaque, installed on sanctuary exterior
- 2019: Renovations on downtown campus carriage house; demolition of education building and temporary move to James Island campus for worship and activities
- 2022: Grand opening of new Learning Center and return to campus for all activities
